



SMALL ONSEEPKANS ENTERPRISE THRIVES

A small business in Onseepkans is turning invasive alien trees into firewood for local homes. Cousins Roger and Nadine Josob started their enterprise almost two years ago to meet the need for affordable, reliable firewood in the community.

With new equipment, health and safety training, and funding support, the business now fulfils 20 to 30 orders a month, including for tourists and campsites.
